## London Gold Medal



We are both proud and delighted to announce that Imperial graduates have achieved both awards in the London Gold Medal prize. Matko Marlais (*left*) has been awarded the Gold Medal, and Nishma Manek (*below, right*) the Betuel Prize. This is an excellent achievement for both of these candidates.

The academic quality of candidates competing in this event is extremely high. All London medical schools (George's, KCL, QMUL, UCL and Imperial) are invited to nominate a small number of newly graduated students to compete for the Gold Medal annually. The nominated candidates are selected by each School from those who obtained the highest number of Merits and Distinctions and have passed every examination at the first attempt.

## Medawar Prize – 2010-11

Traditions do matter, not least in institutions with a combined medical and scientific mission. Sir Peter Medawar was one of the most influential Scientists who worked at Northwick Park in the former Clinical Research Centre. This prize has been awarded since 1997 to the medical student who produces the best patient case study – emphasizing the scientific importance of the study. The student has to present the case in the hospital Grand Round where professors, consultants and junior members are present.

The 2010-11 joint winners were Claire Taylor and Adam Nawaz both studying at Imperial College London. Claire's case was on: Familial Adenomatous Polyposis Associated Desmoid Tumours and Adam's was on: Popliteal Artery Entrapment Syndrome.

The prize was presented at Northwick Park Hospital by Miss Joan Pitkin Director of Clinical Studies following Claire's and Adam's impressive discourse on their patient case study. The occasion was a stimulating and moving one.




### Blackboard

Blackboard has been in use throughout the Faculty of Medicine to deliver its undergraduate online courses requiring VLE functionality. The new version of Blackboard, Version 9, is a combination of the original Blackboard and WebCT products, and is not a straightforward upgrade from our existing version. Hence the College e-Learning Strategy Committee (ELSC) felt that this offered a good opportunity for the College to review its options for a future VLE to support teaching, both now and in future.

ELSC have set up a working group to review the College's use of Virtual Learning Environments (VLEs) with a view to replacing the current VLE, Blackboard. It is anticipated that a new VLE will be in place for the start of the 2012/2013 academic year. ### BLEnDT - Blended Learning Design Tool

Blended learning combines face-to-face and online teaching and learning. However, finding the right balance for blended learning programmes has been identified as a challenge. The Blended Learning Design Tool (BLEnDT©) helps to guide Learning Technologists, Curriculum Designers, Academics and Subject Matter Experts to identify the best blended learning approach according to the intended learning outcomes.



BLEnDT© is currently used by the e-Learning team for the design of Blended Learning activities at undergraduate medicine level. BLEnDT© is also being used in the design of Blended Learning activities for the new curriculum of the new Singapore Medical School formed by Imperial College London and Nanyang Technological University: the Lee Kong Chian School of Medicine. ## The Imperial College Medical Management Society



The Imperial College Medical Management Society is a new and innovative society at Imperial College London borne out of the growing realisation that tomorrow's doctors are both clinicians and managers.

The founding students share the opinion that despite management

and leadership skills taking an increasingly important role in everyday clinical medicine, there is little emphasis within the curriculum of medical schools. Therefore, the society set out to create awareness about Healthcare Manage

ment, Social Policy, Clinical Leadership and Medical Entrepreneurship, and also provide a forum where students, doctors, academics and social healthcare policy experts could convene to debate the issues that are revolutionising healthcare in Britain today.

The committee came together from an intrinsic interest in the subject of medical management, with many having studied the intercalated BSc degree in *Business Management and Healthcare* at Imperial College London. The committee comprises of students from a range of pre-clinical and clinical years reflecting the interest that medical management has at all levels of the medical school. The society was also very fortunate to have the support of those at the Imperial College Medical School, Imperial College Business School and from Mr Colin Bicknell and Mr Oliver Warren.

Although still in its infancy, the Medical Management Society has already hosted two highly successful events, highlighting the enormous interest amongst medical students, clinicians and academics alike. Thus far, these events have introduced the topics of medical management, leadership and entrepreneurship to the general medical school community as well those students and doctors who wish to actively pursue a career in medical management.

The inaugural event titled *The Importance of Leadership in Medicine* was an astounding success with an audience of over 200 medical students and junior doctors, many travelling from as far as Bath and Bristol. Professor Stephen Smith and Dr Tim Heymann delivered highly engaging and thought provoking talks on the role of leadership in the healthcare system and the importance of clinical input in decision making at a hospital, trust and national level.

The society built on this success in the New Year with the second event titled *Can a Doctor Run a Business*. The talk explored the role of doctors as innovators at a micro and macro scale and again boasted excellent speakers. Mr Colin Bicknell spoke about innovation at a ward level and was followed by Professor Martin Elliot who spoke of the lessons that can be learnt from industries and how collaboration and information transfer can bring about hugely successful results for both parties. The evening was closed by a very special talk from the two Imperial graduate founders of *Tournistrip*, providing first-hand evidence and insight into how doctors can be both clinicians and entrepreneurs.



It is exciting times for the society that has come a long way in its first year. The first two events have demonstrated the very significant interest in medical management and laid the platform for continued success and development over the coming years.

The Singapore Medical School continues to make advancements towards various ambitious milestones to ensure all is in place for the inaugural cohort in August 2013.

In London, the momentum on curriculum development continues with additional staff from the Faculty of Medicine and beyond, being asked to contribute to the development. In April, the London Office hosted an afternoon seminar for those working on the project to come together and share thoughts on the progress to date. We also had a highly successful curriculum away day at the end of February where delegates from both Imperial and Singapore came together to agree the joint vision for the new curriculum.

### Visit by NTU Infrastructure and ICT Delegation

During early March 2011 Imperial College London played host to a group of colleagues from Nanyang Technological University, the Singapore Ministry of Education, and the National Healthcare Group (*left*). The purpose of the trip



was a fact-finding exercise to better understand the brief needed for the architects who will be renovating 107 Mandalay Road, the new medical school building (*below*).

The visitors explored much of the South Kensington Campus and especially the Sir Alexander Fleming Building and were greatly helped by

briefings from experts from the capital projects and planning team at Imperial before being similarly briefed by the Director of ICT.



They also visited the NHLI and the Royal Brompton Campus followed by trips to the Charing Cross Campus where they saw the pathology museum, human anatomy skills lab, dissection lab and Student Union facilities and followed this with a visit to the Wolfson Education Centre at the Hammersmith Campus and the Cyclotron and Burlington Danes. Finally they were given a tour of St Mary's Hospital including the respiratory research unit and the communication suite.
