

## Course work – assessment guidelines

### • Penalties for late submission:

5% will be deducted from the awarded mark for assessed work for each day late up to 14 days after the deadline. No mark will be awarded for work submitted after fourteen days.

### • Penalties for word count:

1% of the mark will be deducted for every 1% over the word limit

NOTE: if you do not complete an essay, you are still required to submit a blank document via Blackboard to be allowed to progress to the next Module of the course.


